September Speaker: Glen Kessler: Meaning in One's Art

Most of us begin our artistic journeys with simple goals in mind: can we make a pretty picture, will it look like our subject, are we having fun? Along the way we accumulate the skills of drawing, color, composition, and a sense of what type of pictures we like to make. But eventually, perhaps inevitably, we reach a point where we ask ourselves 'is this it?'

The search for meaning in one's art can be a challenging and frustrating endeavor. Yet over a lifetime it can reveal the highest level of satisfaction in the art making process. Glen Kessler will speak about how he, his students, and history's great artists have navigated this journey successfully.

Glen Kessler combines art and technology in an elegant, thought-provoking way. His oil paintings and pastel drawings evoke landscape imagery in subtle, atmospheric spaces. In truth, these 'landscapes' are actually computer circuit boards seen from 'street level.' The work is meant to involve the viewer in a contemplation of how technology is shaping our understanding of the world.

Glen's work has earned numerous national prizes and is in dozens of international collections including Prince Charles, Ford's Theater, and Yale University. Most recently he won 'The Artist's Magazine' International Competition, was awarded a Maryland State Arts Council Individual Artist's Award (this award is bestowed upon just 6 painters every 3 years), earned Best In Show honors at numerous juried exhibitions, and his work will be the subject of a feature article in an upcoming issue of 'The Artist's Magazine.' Glen has a Master of Fine Arts degree in Painting from The New York Academy of Art. He has taught painting at The Maryland Institute College of Art for over a decade. He maintains a studio at Capitol Arts Network in Rockville, MD.

Critique by Penny Kritt

Let's do something different for this month. We'll look at a painting by Australian artist Colley Whisson (www.colleywhisson.com).

Whisson has done a masterful job with his use of color and design. Let's bring out the tools we have used in the past to define how he created such a soft and emotive painting.

Values: Part of what makes such a gentle feeling here is that most of the values used are mid tones. There are a few lights around the curtains, in the reflection in the mirror and on the newspaper. Then he anchors the composition with a few darks in the shadow on the lower left and on the woman's dress.

Intensity: There are no really intense colors here. Each color selection is a tertiary (made up of a combination of red, blue and yellow). Well, there may be one spot of intense color in the teal blue light on her skirt, but muted use of color adds to the serenity of the work.

In the image below, I added some small patches of intense colors. The orange in her pocket, the yellow on the top of her head and a few green leaves on the plant are just too bright and they stick out like sore thumbs.



This is a perfect reminder that, although we tend to choose all those lovely intense colors like Alizarin crimson (a bright red with blue undertones), sap green that looks like the crayons we all used to draw grass and others, they work much better when they are toned down with the primary color(s) that they are missing. You don't have to add so much that you end up with "mud", but a little bit can work miracles.

Temperature: Most of the colors Whisson used are cool -- greens, soft blues and purples. That left room for a temperature contrast that is a subtle way of leading the viewer through the painting. There is almost no value contrast between the yellow shine on the top of her hair and the wall behind it yet we see the glow of sun because of the warm (tertiary!) yellow against the cooler green wall and purple shadows behind her.

Look at how nicely the cool throw pillows show up against the warm peach seat cushion on the wicker chair. Below the chair cushion, Whisson kept the crosshatch pattern of the wicker against the cool wall color instead of having it fade against the warmer orange floor color.

Now let's examine his use of shapes. Go back to the original and pay attention to how your eyes move around the painting. You will probably linger and move slowly from place to place – until you get to the woman's head. If you're like most folks, you suddenly find yourself racing to the window to find out what she's looking at. So is this a painting about a woman or a painting about what's going on outside?

Let's flip the image and see what happens.



Now the painting is clearly about the woman. In this version, the window is a relatively plain and uninteresting shape. Her gaze sends you back for another look to see what you missed! This is because we tend to "read" paintings from the upper left to the lower right. If you lived in Asia or Israel where they read from right to left, you would do the opposite. A rule of thumb is that anything with a face in your composition should look to the left. When the "gaze" faces right, the viewer is more likely to be rushed out of the painting. The same rule works with animals, toys with faces or anything that looks like it has eyes.

Compare what happens in the lower right corner of each version. In the original, the chair leg directs you out of the bottom of the painting. In the flipped version, now the dark shape below and behind her elbow becomes a backstop to keep you within the confines of the painting.

Now consider the thin pinkish line at the top of the chair at the center of the painting. In the original, you'll follow her arm down and that pink line will speed you to nowhere. In the flipped version, just the opposite happens. That line leads you into her arm, and the diagonal carries you up to her face and back to the window. Now the viewer can circle around again and spend longer enjoying the artwork instead of scanning it and quickly moving off to the next painting.

The Right Side of The Brain



This picture will demonstrate when you are using your Right or Left side of your brain. If you see the picture exactly as it is, you are using the left side. When you stare you will see the figure shift; and you will be using your right brain. You can switch back and forth.

Stare to go to Right brain (it sort of trances you out or puts you in an altered NON THINKING state). Begin thinking and reasoning about it and you will move back out of the altered state into Left brain thinking. Very cool. You will enjoy this if you are using the right side of your brain.

Stare at this picture and you will see this man turn his face. Share this with your friends if you saw him turn his head.

"Light & Shadow" : Juried Art Show at Blanche Ames Gallery



Frederick, MD - The Blanche Ames Gallery invites artists to submit artwork on the theme of , "Light & Shadow," to its Third Biennial Juried Art Show, to be held in November 2013. Juror for the show, Margaret Dowell, MFA, PhD, will select works to receive cash prizes totaling \$1000 at the opening reception for the exhibit, November 3, 2013.

Dr. Dowell, who lives in Southern Maryland, is well known in the Frederick area from her years with Frederick County Public Schools and as an instructor of art and design at area universities. She will review all entries, select up to fifty works for display, then choose award winners during a final round of judging.

For this Third Biennial Show, the Gallery will accept artworks in any medium, including paintings, drawings, watercolors, lithographs, screen prints, photography, ceramics and digital art. It is a regional show, for artists in Maryland and nearby states.

Artworks in two or three dimensions are eligible so long as the work is framed and/or wired for hanging (free-standing work cannot be accommodated.) The artwork must have been completed in the last two years and not previously shown at the Gallery. Artists must be 18 years or older.

Artists will enter one or two works in digital form during the first two weeks in October 2013. The juror's choices for display in the show will be announced on October 19, 2013. Artists will then deliver their accepted entries to the gallery for installation and on-site judging. An opening reception for all artists and the public will be held Sunday November 3, 2013 from 12:30 p.m. – 3:00 p.m.

The Juror's choices for cash awards will be announced during the reception: First Place \$400, Second Place \$250, Third Place \$150, Honorable Mention \$50 (three awards). On November 24, 2013, the final day of the exhibition, the Gallery will give its final \$50 award, People's Choice, to the artist whose work is voted "the artwork that most captures the lights and shadows in my life".

The Blanche Ames Gallery is located in the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Frederick MD, 4880 Elmer Derr Road, Frederick, Maryland.

GLENVIEW MANSION CONFERENCE ROOM SHOWS

You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Starting in 2013, artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date; otherwise they will have one room. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 pm, on the Sunday after hanging! Preferred drop-off and pick-up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Note: please contact the mansion management ahead of time if you wish to modify the drop-off or pick-up times.

For artwork delivery at the Glenview Mansion, please be prepared to unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you - there is no room to store packing materials at the Mansion. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). There is no one to help move artwork from your vehicle to the conference rooms, however, you may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork with help from the Mansion staff. If you have not made labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available when you bring your work to the conference room. If you print your own, they should be on card stock. Please do not use the sticky Avery labels, unless you adhere them to foam core or card stock.

If you are unavailable on the appropriate date for pickup, please arrange with someone to pickup for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion after it comes down.

Please note that in 2014, drop off/pickup switches from Wednesdays to Mondays (unless Monday is a holiday).
