## Critique by Penny Kritt

Lists and Value Sketches

If *you* would like a critique, please email a photo to me at <u>pennykritt@aol.com</u>. Perhaps your work will be chosen for the next issue.

Did you ever find yourself in the middle of a painting or drawing and suddenly realize that you had no idea of what to do next? It needs *something*, but what? More contrast? You forgot to design a center of interest? The proportions are wrong?

The goddess of spontenaity promises a lot, but she's likely to leave before you're ready to sign the finished piece. We've all been there! You had an idea, you just jumped in and things were fine – until they weren't. Now what?

Oh, no -- not another lecture about planning! That's sure to take all the fun out of things, won't it? Actually, no – if you consider planning to be part of the spontenaity. Here's the hard truth. If you don't know what your center of interest is, what your painting is about, neither will the viewer.

Here are two ways to increase your odds of getting a great piece of art.

First, make a list. Think of it like planning for a trip. You don't start packing before you decide whether you're going to the beach or a ski resort. That single decision begins to clarify everything. From there, you can narrow down other choices. Your choice also tells you what clothes to pack, what athletic equipment you'll need and what suitcases to use.

Here's a sample of how it works in art. You've been to a birthday party for a neighbor's one year old daughter Emma, and it was just so adorable that you have to paint something that tells what a joyous occasion it was. So start your list. First, is this a painting about that particular child or just about the fun of a toddler's party? If it's about Emma, just do a portrait of her in a party hat. But if it's about toddlers at a party, maybe all you need to paint is the cake and the presents – a great choice if portraiture isn't your thing.

Let's see what how to compare those ideas.

#### Emma and hat

Portrait orientation

One complex shape (Emma and hat)

Warm pastel midtone colors (pinks in skin tones and Emma's dress) Center of interest is Emma's face

#### **Party Excitement**

Landscape orientation

Multiple shapes (cake, presents, etc.) Bright primary colors (presents, cake and decorations) Center of interest could be anything – presents, the cake, etc.

This is a brief list, but it shows you how to sharpen the focus of your art and make sure you have room for all the necessary shapes.

Now let's add another step to give even greater definition to the design. We'll try several value sketches. A value sketch is a quick and easy way to tell if your shapes are the right size and in the right place. It's just an overview of the big shapes with *all the detail left out*.

A value sketch is no bigger than 3x4 inches and all it deals with is shapes by their value. Once you get good at it (and it took me a long time!), you can knock out a half dozen in 10 minutes. It gives you a safe and easy way to see if you're on the right track before you commit to the big sheet of paper or canvas.

## Emma and Hat

In *Figure 1*, Emma has a dark complexion and a festive outfit of royal blue. We'll put her against a light background so you can see the details of her features and outfit.

This time, Emma is a pale child, and *Figure 2* below puts her against a dark background so you can really see her. There's just enough detail in the outline to see her party hat and her romper. Also, notice that this time the image is reversed. Compare how your eye moves into and around the compositions and decide which one you like best.





This time, our focus will be on the exciting of the party instead of one child.

In *Figure 3* below, let's look at the idea of that one very special gift nestled by the noisemakers and a napkin. Whatever it is, it's *big*! A landscape format (wider than tall) shows the massive size.

Now compare it to *Figure 4* below. This time, the idea of a crowd is shown by all the gifts, and then you don't have to paint all those pesky figures! This version using a portrait orientation (taller than wide).

Give a little thought to what you're about to do. For your next two compositions, try doing the list and a few value sketches. Just for the next two, so it's not too big a task. And then, if these ideas don't work for you, don't bother doing them again. Why the next *two*? The first time you try almost anything, it's usually difficult, but the second time is easier.

And if you give this a try and get stumped because you don't know what your focal point is, see how much better off you are already? You didn't waste all that paint, paper or canvas and time!

# ADS371: Creative Composition I: Principles of Composition

Effective composition is an essential requirement for all artists and designers whether one is a painter or a multimedia designer. The instructor will use the work of master western artists to illustrate design concepts and how they were applied in highly regarded works of art. Works of master Japanese woodblock printmakers of the 16th -18th centuries will be utilized in comparison. Through the use of collage, you will then develop your own original artwork based on an increased knowledge of the principles of composition in both the West and the East. You will have the concepts to increase the visual impact of your own artwork utilizing the medium of collage. Some supplies are provided.

Egyptian paintings and the works of Andy Warhol both were created using the same "grid" as an underlying structure employing design concepts such as similarity, repetition, pattern and variety for recognition, interest, and contrast. You will study a variety of techniques developed by artists long ago as well as modern artists who are working today. Using collage, you will create well-composed original artworks based on the techniques presented in class. Some supplies are provided. Starting in 2013, artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date; otherwise they will have one room. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 pm, on the Sunday after hanging! Preferred drop-off and pick-up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Note: please contact the mansion management ahead of time if you wish to modify the drop-off or pick-up times.

For artwork delivery at the Glenview Mansion, please be prepared to unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you - there is no room to store packing materials at the Mansion. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). There is no one to help move artwork from your vehicle to the conference rooms, however, you may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork with help from the Mansion staff. If you have not made labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available when you bring your work to the conference room. If you print your own, they should be on card stock. Please do not use the sticky Avery labels, unless you adhere them to foam core or card stock.

If you are unavailable on the appropriate date for pickup, please arrange with someone to pickup for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion after it comes down.

Please note that in 2014, drop off/pickup switches from Wednesdays to Mondays (unless Monday is a holiday).
