About Our April Speaker:

We all have to photograph our art work, whether it is to enter it into a show or for our website or to e-mail to a client or even just for our own records.

Come and find out how to do it this yourself. Tips for photographing your artwork and prepping your photographs for upload to the internet. I will do a demo and encourage you to bring your cameras and questions.

We will discuss lighting, exposure, white balance and cropping, as well as image format (i.e. jpgs), image size (i.e Mb) and ppi. That way you will know what it means when a call requests images 1920x1920 at 72ppi no larger than 1 Mb.

Liliane Blom is a classically trained painter and an award winning photographer whose distinct style mixes her love of both media into a new one. Digital painting is what she calls her fusion of painting and photography. Her pieces are printed on canvas or watercolor paper and are later enhanced with oils/pastels and often with gold or silver leaf. Based in Rockville, Maryland of French/Norwegian extraction she is a frequent exhibitor in the Washington region.

Liliane Blom is also an installation artist. Her installation art is interactive and often environmental in scope. They are multisensory experiences which engage the viewer with sound/touch and light.

RAL Juried Member Art Show Glenview Mansion May 4 – 26, 2014

Judge: Susan Main will be our juror for the May Member Show. She is the curatorial consultant for VisArts in Rockville. She has a M.F.A. in Painting and also a M.F.A. in Interactive Media and Digital Arts from University of Maryland. Susan's artwork can be viewed at www.susanmain.net. She will conduct a gallery walk-through on Thursday, May 1, at 6:30 PM.

Eligibility and rules: Each member in good standing may enter two works. The maximum length of any framed side is 60 inches. Only original works securely framed with hanging wire are acceptable. The entries must have been completed within the last two years and may not have been exhibited previously in a RAL Member Show. No photographs, no reproductions, no giclées and no wet canvases are allowed. A work having multiple framed parts must meet the two works per member criteria. Entries not meeting the show conditions will not be accepted. RAL retains the right to determine suitability of work for entry in this show. Artist's signature on the Show Agreement also constitutes a commitment to donate 20% of the sale price to the City of Rockville for works sold during the show.

Deadline: June 15, 2014 for entries

Location: 1800 Glenallan Avenue Wheaton, MD 20902

RAL members are invited to exhibit at Brookside Gardens from September 22 to November 3, 2014. Only 2-D media with a nature-related theme will be accepted for jurying by the RAL board. No sculptures for this venue. All artwork is for sale with Brookside taking 25% commission.

Eligibility and Rules: Artist must be a RAL member with current dues paid in September 2014. Works must be framed or gallery wrapped (sides must be painted) and ready to hang with hanging wire. Maximum size is 42" x 42." All artwork must have a nature-related theme. All 2-D media will be accepted for jurying by the RAL board. There is no restriction on age of artwork or having been exhibited in any member show. A \$5.00 entry fee will be collected from accepted artists only.

Send up to 10 images to:

vp@rockvilleartleague.org by Sunday, June 15, 2014. Depending on the amount of artwork submitted will determine how many pieces selected. The board will try to be as inclusive as possible. All emails should have "Brookside show" in the subject line. Images should be submitted in jpeg format only. Please rename your jpeg to include last name, title, and size, for example, LastnameTitle16x20.jpeg. We will need this info to jury properly. You will be notified by July 13, or sooner, which images have been selected. At that time we will ask for the entry fee.

Giclée prints or original artwork will also be accepted for the bin. All bin work, between the sizes of 11" X 14" and 16" X 20," should have a backing and be in a clear bag enclosure (these may be found at clearbags.com or Plaza Art). The bin will hold up to 30 prints. This total will be divided up between the numbers of exhibiting artists.

Delivery is Monday, September 22, 2014 at 10:00AM and Pick up is Monday, November 3, 2014 at 9:00AM. Parking lot repairs will be going on at this time so we will keep you informed as to where to load and unload your artwork.

Sales: Brookside Gardens will receive a 25% commission on any sales made during the exhibit or for a 6 month period after the exhibit. Brookside Gardens relies upon the Artist to submit the 25% commission on any sales made after the exhibition that were initiated during the Artist's show at Brookside Gardens. Artists with sold work must be registered as a vendor with M-NCPPC and must complete a "new vendor form" which will be emailed to you after the close of the exhibit. This form requires your social security number. Only artists with sold work are required to complete this form. After completion of the new vendor form it may take at least 30 days to receive your check.

The Pepco Edison Place Gallery is a dedicated space available to nonprofit arts organizations. The gallery can hold eighty 2-D artworks plus sculpture but the artist must provide their own pedestals or stands. The gallery space, a receptionist, and security are provided at no charge to RAL. Gallery hours are Tuesday through Friday 12-4:00 pm. Works may be offered for sale, but the artist will be responsible for conducting the sale and no commission is taken.

Eligibility and Rules: Artist must be a RAL member with current dues paid in September 2014. Works must be framed or gallery wrapped (sides must be painted) and ready to hang with hanging wire. Maximum size is 60" x 60." All 2-D media and sculptures will be accepted for jurying by the RAL board. There is no restriction on age of artwork or having been exhibited in any member show. 3-D artists must supply their own pedestals for display in the gallery. A \$20.00 fee will be collected from accepted artists only to cover post cards and reception costs. You will need to submit a 1 page bio, which will be included in the folder of exhibiting artists at the gallery.

Hands on Collage Workshop on May 17th: "Influence of 'Edo' Japanese Woodblock Prints on Impressionism, Post Impressionism and Modern Western Design Concepts," presented by Patricia Zannie

Come and explore Japanese 17-18th Century Woodblock Prints developed during the time of the last feudal military government. That is when the Shogun ruled Japan from his castle in Edo and the Emperor was just a figurehead, living in Kyoto. In 1635 the Seclusion Laws banned trade with the outside world for over 200 years.

When Japan opened its doors, Western artists discovered and were intrigued by the different Japanese design concepts that had developed and were unlike those in the West. Rebel artists such as Monet, Degas, Cassatt, Van Gogh, Toulouse-Lautrec and Matisse changed their painting styles, incorporating many of the Japanese design concepts into their own works. These design concepts are still in use today.

This workshop will present examples of Japanese design concepts such as "negative space," "flattening of the picture plane," cropping and images of "the floating world of Courtesans & Geishas." It will also present examples of the Western artists' incorporation of these concepts, as well as include tips on creativity, composition and collage. Patricia will also share some of her experiences studying art in Japan, as well as her use of these concepts in her own artwork. Participants will receive Origami, Ogura lace, Mulberry, and other Oriental specialty papers, as well as papers from other countries. Using the technique of collage, participants will create their own artwork based on inspirations from these artists.

Participants should bring their own scissors and tacky glue (NOT much liquid) or rubber cement and some old newspapers. If you have some Oriental keepsakes, postcards or trinkets to add to your artwork, bring them too.

The workshop will be held on Saturday May 17th from 9:30 to 12:30 at Elwood Smith Rec Center, 601 Harrington Road, Rockville, MD. RAL will fund the workshop by using grant money, making the workshop FREE for 30 RAL members. Refreshments will be served. Critique by Penny Kritt

Nail Their Feet to the Floor!

If *you* would like a critique, please email a photo to me at <u>pennykritt@aol.com</u>. Perhaps your work will be chosen for the next issue.

It's just the coolest thing to see someone stopped in front of your artwork and watch their eyes move around through the piece and then go around again! And it's *much* better than seeing them glance at your work and quickly move on to what's hanging on the next hook. So here are a few ideas on how to keep them enjoying *your* art. First, avoid the trite. If you want to paint something pretty for spring, avoid the boring vase of tulips. And if you just have to paint those tulips, do it from a different perspective. Maybe from the viewpoint of a bug inside the flower looking out? Or maybe include one tulip that's well past its prime as a comment on the fragility of life?

Second, whatever you're painting, from abstract to portraiture to still life, you're making shapes. Make those shapes interesting and make them relate to each other. Here's an example of a process to help you work out what concept/shapes you want to work with:

a. Start with an idea of what you want to paint. I'm going to do a planning sketch of a scene at a pond that I like to visit.





When you have a horizon or any strong horizontal line that goes across the entire composition, don't put it in the middle. Have it either one third from the top or one third from the bottom. Even if you've got something like a brown wooden table top and a pink curtain behind it, if that horizontal line is in the middle, it will look like two paintings stacked in one frame.

I also added a man in a boat to make things a little more interesting. Having the figure cross the horizon line connects what would otherwise be two big boring unconnected rectangles of water and sky. There's still a problem because that pesky horizon line leads you right out of the picture. We have to fix that!

I added a tree on the right and it does double duty for me. First, it's clearly closer to the viewer, so it gives the painting some depth. It's so tall that you only see the end of a drooping branch – that's conveniently pointed back toward the fisherman. See how that keeps the viewer circling within the frame?

I got this idea because of a family story about Grampa out fishing one day. All the cousins know that it was important that he had a cooler of Coca Cola on the nearby pier, so let's add that to the lower left to break up that big empty bottom shape.

When the word "coke" was completely visible, it somehow made the boat and figure *disappear*. I fixed that by conveniently placing another box in front that obscured most of the lettering.

And the rest of the story is that a big red cardinal watched Grampa catch a big fish. Let's add those elements.





Now other problems have surfaced! The red bird has now become the center of interest. The human eye always goes to red (or the closest to red – like stop signs!). Also, the brim of Grampa's hat is parallel with the horizon, so now he's looking off into the distance, not at the fish he's about to catch. Lines, especially straight ones, tend to send the viewer quickly from one place to another if they're no broken by another shape. See how quickly the fishing pole sends your eye right to the bird and then down into the water?

A few changes have told the story and fixed the composition. First, our bright male cardinal has become a less colorful female. That bright red is now on Grampa's hat, and the brim makes a diagonal that points the viewer to the ripples where a fish is about to be hauled out.

Ta da! Now the horizon brings you to Grampa, our center of interest. If you following the fishing pole up to the bird, the tree branch will lead you back down the tree trunk and the left to the ripples and further to the dock that's right below Grampa, and you're ready to go around again.

Or follow the horizon to Grampa and go down the fishing line to the ripples. Turn left and see the dock, which is under Grampa. Now follow his fishing pole up to the bird, the branch and back down the tree.

Put your hand over the tree and see how the horizon line leads you out of the picture? Now cover up the dock, and the water becomes a big boring shape that takes you out of the border on the left.

Your composition is made up of shapes and lines. Use them to speed the viewer to another location or linger to enjoy something special. Likewise, bright colors will keep viewers in a spot longer than more muted colors.

Try a version of these little sketches before you begin your next project!

Use the red vertical line that goes through the tip of her nose to see that the tear duct in the left eye is almost directly above that point, but the right eye tear duct is much further away. Also, you might assume that red line would also hit the middle of her mouth and the middle of her chin, but this technique points out how a tilt of the head changes the location of the features in relation to each other.

For artwork delivery at the Glenview Mansion, please be prepared to unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you - there is no room to store packing materials at the Mansion. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). There is no one to help move artwork from your vehicle to the conference rooms, however, you may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork with help from the Mansion staff. If you have not made labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available when you bring your work to the conference room. If you print your own, they should be on card stock. Please do not use the sticky Avery labels, unless you adhere them to foam core or card stock.

If you are unavailable on the appropriate date for pickup, please arrange with someone to pickup for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion after it comes down.

Please note that in 2014, drop off/pickup switches from Wednesdays to Mondays (unless Monday is a holiday).
