Dear Rockville Art League members,



October’s Speaker: John Murray

John Murray is a contemporary artist who works primarily in oil. His subject matter includes figure, landscape, still-life and portraiture. Inspired by the classical masters as a boy, his traditional training and artistic development has led to quality work. His paintings carry an appealing sense of clarity and color. Murray was educated at the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA) in Baltimore and the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts (PAFA) in Philadelphia. In 1991 he studied at the John Michael Angel Studio in Florence, Italy. Upon graduation, he became one of four banknote designers at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, where he drew presidential portraits and worked on

currency designs for 16 years. In 2005, he decided to leave the Bureau to pursue his art career full time. The same year, as a faculty member at the Corcoran School of Art, he won a grant from the Corcoran to do post-graduate work at the Repin Academy in St. Petersburg, Russia.

In 2001, his wife Lena, a Russian artist, founded the Bridgeview School of Fine Art in New York. John Murray is a co-founder and guest teacher at the Bridgeview School. Since 2005, John and Lena have been organizing summer master classes for American students in St. Petersburg, Russia at the famous Repin Academy of Painting, Sculpture and Architecture.

John has exhibited in many venues including the International Art Expo in New York City, the Strathmore Museum in Bethesda, Maryland, and the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, where he won Best of Show Alumni Award in 2002. He lives in Silver Spring, Maryland and teaches drawing, painting and sculpture at the Corcoran School of Art while continuing to paint. He is represented by Nichols Gallery in Charlottesville, Virginia and Newman Gallery in Philadelphia.

Major commissions include a portrait of Supreme Court Clerk Suiter, a religious mural for the Jesuit Chapel at the Georgetown University and a historic restoration of the dome of the Hispanic Gala Theater in Washington DC.

John will demonstrate painting a portrait for us at our meeting. He will work from a live model.



Critique by Penny Kritt

Jasmin Smith

As always, the place to start a critique is to ask the artist three questions. First, what do you want to say? Second, where do you feel you have succeeded? And finally, what issues do you think are unresolved?

Jasmin said, "I absolutely love this painting. The background is interesting. I have applied many layers of transparent paint - wet onto dry. I use this process of layering, flatness of form and color to create a sense of depth and subtle chromatic variation within the work.

The animals in these paintings are generic. They are supposed to be happy living in paradise. I need to convey that they are happy and peaceful in their environment not knowing anything about poaching, encroaching and the sixth mass extinction facing our planet."



Extinction Series: Impressions of Cave Art by Jasmin Smith

Fluid acrylic on Canvas (4 panels – 12x12 inch)

Jasmin has done a fine job creating both shapes and symbols. The three yellowish foreground shapes are clearly large animals and she has made each shape slightly different for a nice variety. The addition of the black, orange and yellow lines on the animals is a wonderful ornamentation that adds weight to the shapes without resorting to realism. Using those lines elsewhere gives a continuity to the four panels so the viewer's eye moves effortlessly around the composition.

The pink flower shape in the middle of the panels adds a sense of lush foliage. The line work there is a nice variant of the lines on the animals.

Jasmin's comments define my challenge. She likes her technique with paint, her shapes are fine and the composition suits her. The problem is that she feels she hasn't yet captured the naïve sense that this environment is both perfect and unthreatened.

While abstracts are often difficult to critique because one cannot "see" inside the artist's head for an exact view of his vision, this one is relatively easy because what's missing is a more obvious sense of comfort and sustainability of one's environment.

Thus, rather than just give directions on how to fix this particular composition, the mandate to give a sense of comfort within a lush environment can be expressed in a generic way that will also apply to realistic landscapes or any other type of composition that has a happy emotional content.

“Happy” usually implies daytime and that the sun is shining. That bright time of day tends to have at least some primary and secondary colors. Further, the way to show sunlight is to have large value contrasts that show parts of objects in bright light and also their darker cast shadows. Both of those concepts are missing. Here are some changes to consider:

While Jasmin is justifiable proud of the subtle colors she has built, it is hard to build colors this way without them taking on a gray or brown cast. That happens whenever layers of color eventually contain all three primary colors (red, yellow and blue). Then those bright colors become more and more tertiary appearance which explains why so many of her colors look like the day is overcast or rainy.

In Figure 1 above, the right side was modified in Photoshop. Changes made were to make the colors less tertiary. The greens, pinks, blues and yellows are all a little brighter. The image has now gives the viewer a sense that the animals are enjoying a pleasant climate. Sunlight also always lightens the mood of a composition, so the animal on the right was made a slightly brighter color and a dark

shadow was added under it. This works well with the black shapes that Jasmin has inserted throughout the piece.

Lest some of you think that this has destroyed Jasmin’s layering technique, Figure 2 below has little squares inserted so you can see how her layering technique has been modified, not abandoned. The colors are still aren’t those of bright crayons, but the mood has lightened considerably.

Finally, since this is part of a series, here’s a suggestion to further enhance her goal of the managed survival of the herd.



The animal on the far right has been enlarged and now overlaps the middle figure. This variance implies adults and younger animals thus insuring the survival of the herd. It also suggests that they live peacefully in close proximity to each other.



You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 PM on the **Sunday** after hanging. Preferred drop off and pick up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Drop off/pickups are Mondays (unless a holiday). If you are unavailable on the date for pickup, please arrange for someone to pick up for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion. If you are unable to drop off/pick up on the assigned dates and you can't find someone else to drop off/pick up for you, please choose a month in which you can make those dates.

For artwork delivery, please unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). You may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion to move your artwork from your vehicle. There is no staff at the mansion available to help you move your artwork into the conference rooms. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork, with help from the Mansion staff. If you don't have labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available. If you print your own, print them on card stock.
