Message from the President, Patrick Sieg

Dear Rockville Art League artists,

"Abstraction allows man to see with his mind what he cannot physically see with his eyes. Abstract art enables the artist to perceive beyond the tangible, to abstract the infinite out of the finite. It is the emancipation of the mind. It is an exploration into unknown areas." Arshile Gorky, Armenian/American Abstract Expressionist.

I understand this quote and, but I still don't understand abstract art...I wish I did. I particularly like the "emancipation of the mind" part of the quote above.

"People will never understand what we are doing if they can't feel. All art is abstract. But it's all real...We were all trying to bring that spirit that spontaneous energy, into our work." Joan Mitchell, American Abstract Expressionist.

I know what I like, and I believe I can tell the difference between master abstract art and the less thoughtful. I wish I could say why I like an abstract art piece. It has much to do with movement and exciting colors and the emotion I feel when I am viewing. "I want things that I couldn't at times articulate." We have a number of terrific abstract artists in our league and fortunately the number seems to be growing. We have practitioners of abstract on display in our current juried show and, coming in March and April, in the conference rooms. In March the work of MariaTeresa Camacho-Hall and in April, Gloria Miotto's will be on display in rooms 5 and 6 and we are glad they are exhibiting there.

Last month we had educator and artist Ruth Lozner presenting to our group and not only did she share a



terrific presentation; she also gave me a glimpse into the thinking about abstract art, and art in general.

In our March meeting, Dave Allen, artist, educator and RAL Board member, will present to the group on the topic of abstract art with a focus on the Abstract Expressionists. This topic is long overdue. Dave has his master's degree in Art History and abstract art is a lifelong interest. Dave is an impressive and expressive speaker. At the conclusion of Dave's presentation, MariaTeresa Camacho-Hall will be hosting a conversation on abstract art in gallery rooms 5 and 6. What a terrific combination of tell and show. I hope members can attend our meeting on March 5 and see, hear both. It echoes the subject of how to talk about art that was shared in the February meeting.

We are heading into spring and there are many things art related taking place in our area. Not the least of which is preparing for our juried members' spring show. We are asking that members submit their entries (one or two per member) by April 2. That date will allow our Judge Ruth Lozner a short time to jury our entries, Lisa time to organize and communicate the accepted work and each artist time to finalize the framing of their accepted entries. Art drop off for this show is on May 11 and Ruth Lozner will view the work in person to select the award winners. She will conduct a gallery walkthrough the same week.

Finally, I hope you had a chance to visit the mansion gallery and view the beautiful work by Rockville Students in grades 6 through 12. The City of Rockville and the Rockville Art League co-hosted the Rockville Student Juried Art Show and, frankly, I was hugely impressed by the talent on display. The student artists and their parents, family and friends attended the opening reception on February 2, and the energy and pride in the gallery was palpable. A number of RAL members attended the show opening and your support was much appreciated. As I viewed the work, I wished that I had their talent when I was a school student. Then I thought, it would be nice if I had their talent now.

Thank you all for supporting the Rockville Art League and art in our community. See you soon and keep creating.

Call for entries: <u>deadline Thursday</u>, <u>April 2</u>. *Online registrations only*.

We are excited that the Rockville Art League Juried Member's Spring Show will be on exhibit at Glenview Mansion and honored to have Ruth Lozner as our judge.

Judge: Ruth Lozner received a BFA from Carnegie-Mellon University, and a MFA from American University. She has held faculty positions at the University of Maryland, College Park, Parsons School of Design, New York, and the University of the Arts, Philadelphia. She currently holds the titles of Professor Emerita from the University of Maryland and Fellow of the Royal Society the Arts, UK. While her professional as well as academic career has encompassed painting, editorial illustration, film and print art direction, for the last 15 years she has focused her passion, imagination and energies on assemblage sculpture and collage. More recently she has embarked on new conceptual directions while collaborating with other artists to achieve her goals. In addition, she is an education consultant, lecturing and giving workshops to artists and designers on a variety of subjects including "The Creative Process and the Art of Brainstorming," "Innovative Design Thinking Methods," "Visual Literacy," and "The Intersection of Design and Art Throughout History."

Ruth Lozner will conduct a gallery walk-though on **Thursday, May 14 at 6:30pm**.

Call Deadline: You will be asked to submit your work **online only**. *Members in good standing* may submit up to 2 pieces of work for this show now through **Thursday**, **April 2**. No submissions will be accepted after the <u>April 2</u> <u>deadline</u>. If your work was accepted into this show, you will be informed <u>by Monday</u>, <u>April</u> <u>20</u>. Please *read all the information below* carefully before submitting.

Entry Fee: A \$10 show fee will be collected when *accepted* artwork is dropped off along with the show agreement.

Eligibility and rules: The following rules apply for all works entered. Each member **in good standing** may enter up to two pieces. For <u>each</u> <u>piece</u> you will need to <u>submit a separate online</u> <u>JotForm</u>. For each submission you will be required to submit an image of your piece on the online form. *Please rename* your image (jpg or jpeg) with your artwork's title, prior to uploading it.

The maximum measurement of any framed side is **48 inches**. Only **original** works <u>framed</u> <u>securely with hanging wire</u> are acceptable. (No sawtooth hangers or such.) If submitting unframed canvas, edges should be painted or finished. No reproductions, no giclées, and **no**

wet canvases are allowed. The entries may not

have been exhibited previously in a RAL Juried Members' Show. All artists should clearly mark their name and title on the back of their piece. Entries not meeting the show conditions will not be accepted. RAL retains the right to determine suitability of work for entry in this show. Artists will be required to sign a show agreement to be submitted with their work at registration and also sign it out at the final pick up. (If your work is accepted into this show, you will receive the show agreement.) All **work must remain up** until the end of the show on the pick-up date on Monday, June 29.

Sales: Requests for purchase by interested buyers will be forwarded to the artists by the *City of Rockville* who handles the sales. Please contact the Rockville Art League president or juried show coordinator for any questions about this. The artist's signature on the Show Agreement also constitutes a commitment to donate 20% of the sale price to the *City of Rockville* for works sold during the show.

Critique by Penny Kritt Capturing Postures

Have you tried painting *crowds* of people? This is a technique that tells the viewers that a lot of people are on the move. It's an entirely different concept of doing a portrait. It's just like sometimes you do a huge painting of a single maple leaf, but other times you paint a whole limb and its leaves as a single shape. With the former, you have room within the picture space to get into all the little details.

When you paint a crowd, it's more like painting an azalea bush in full bloom *as part of a larger garden scene*. You take a green squatty shape and add some random pink dots to indicate flowers. The overall colors and combinations of shapes give viewers just enough info to identify a flowering shrub and defines it as part of the background -- for a center of interest in another part of the composition.

Why paint crowds? It's a great and easy way to add both a group statement and activity in a situation. It's also a fabulous way to have a single large complex shape that isn't the center of interest, but it tells a lot about the scene.

In my opinion, it's important for an instructor to balance providing information with asking questions that give students an opportunity to figure things out for themselves. I've already explained why crowds are a useful element in a composition Here's your chance to reason your way into how and where to use them.

Here are some groups of people. With each one, describe their collective mood. Are they calm, happy or angry? Are they coming toward you or moving away? And if you can't tell, does it matter?



Crowd C

If you've taken the time to answer the questions above, let's *quantify* what makes them so different.

Here's the most important question of all – why *did you choose those answers?* Figuring out what made you *feel* that way will help you each time you think about how to add people in compositions.

In Crowd A, some figures are in color so you can better see how the figures overlap each other. The blue boy is closest to us. You can tell because parts of him overlap both the black and pink girls standing on the left and the yellow girl on the right. The pink girl is closer to us than the black girl. The yellow girl and the green boy are farthest from us, the viewers.

Without the pink, yellow and green figures, this might look like they were all victims of a robbery because of their raised hands. Luckily, the pink girl's flying hair and the raised legs of the pink and green figures also suggest a dancing pose. The yellow girl's slouched posture and her arms draped around others also tells us it is a happy situation.

In Crowd B, the afternoon light is behind the crowd and they make a single complex silhouette. Even so, we can tell that they just standing around, somewhere between patient and bored. The clue is that their arms hang at their sides. Basically, regardless of which direction they face, their arms and legs are vertical lines. Also, their feet are flat on the ground as opposed to Crowd A which has several angular leg positions, another important clue that they're content that they're not going anywhere for a while.

Crowd C could be cheering people at a concert or stadium. Conversely, it could also be a mob or a riot. In either case, the diagonal arms indicate passionate movement, while the other crowds with both feet on the floor indicate a calmer situation. In Crowd C, without seeing their legs, *we can't tell if they are marching, running or dancing.*

The only reason for the colored figures in Crowd A above was to make it easier for you to see the reasons indicated. If it were just black and white, you could have made most of the same assumptions. With Crowd A, there are few people and more space between them, also indicating dancing. There's less space between the larger number of people in Crowd B. In the cropped version below, the heads are fairly erect, the shoulders are mostly level and the arms are mostly hanging at their sides. Even without seeing their legs and feet, we can tell they are calming standing around.

In a nutshell, when all feet are on the ground, people – and animals – aren't going anywhere, so it's usually a calm scene. When shoulders are level and arms hang straight down, that's another clue. But the minute diagonals show up, things get more interesting. The bend of an elbow or a knee (or paw) shows movement. A tilt of the head to the side may show curiosity or confusion. Arms that touch another person or thing usually indicate appreciation.

Best of all, just a few hints of the traits above in a large crowd scene speak volumes to the viewer!

You can show your artwork in Glenview Mansion for one month if you have received a 1st, 2nd, 3rd or honorable mention award in an RAL juried show. Artists may have both rooms to exhibit in if a second artist doesn't sign up for the same month within two months of the show's start date. The receptions at Glenview mansion are 1:30-3:30 PM on the Sunday after hanging. Preferred drop off and pick up times for Glenview Shows are from 9 am to 12 noon. Drop off/pickups are Mondays (unless a holiday). If you are unavailable on the date for pickup, please arrange for someone to pick up for you. There is no room to store your artwork at the Mansion. If you are unable to drop off/pick up on the assigned dates and you can't find someone else to drop off/pick up for you, please choose a month in which you can make those dates.

For artwork delivery, please unwrap your work and take the wrappings with you. Please bring pliers (needle nose are easy to work with). You may use the hand truck that is at the Mansion to move your artwork from your vehicle. There is no staff at the mansion available to help you move your artwork into the conference rooms. You are responsible for hanging your own artwork, with help from the Mansion staff. If you don't have labels for your work, please fill out the RAL cards that will be available. If you print your own, print them on card stock.
