Rockville Art League Speaker Series

RAL offers six presentations a year: September, October, November, February, March, and April. They are on zoom. Invitations are sent out a few days prior and also posted on the Rockville Art League website.

Thursday, Sept. 12, Dr. Irina Stotland The Ukrainian Avant-garde

Irina Stotland discussed the work of these select artists of the Ukrainian Avant-garde of The School of Paris, David Burliuk, Sonia Delaunay and Alexandra Exter who are important to Modern Art; two of them are women and one of the women, Sonia Delaunay was the first female artist to have been given a retrospective at the Louvre. Their stories are as fascinating as the work they produced. Thursday, October 3, Lorena Bradford on Let's Look Together

We were delighted to welcome Dr. Lorena Bradford from the National Gallery of Art for an evening of looking at art together. She guided us as we looked at a work of art together, facilitating an interactive conversation. It was a pleasant hour to slow down and truly luxuriate in the selected work – beginning with initial impressions to closer inspection, to observations from the group, and then finding out the fascinating back story. The piece is on display at the National Gallery of Art and would be well worth a trip to see in person. The zoom recording was sent out to RAL members on October 5.

Thursday, Nov. 7, Photographer Michael Koren on *Artistic Expression with Mobile Photography* Thank you to those who joined us on Nov. 7 for Michael Koren's presentation on the camera that's always with us, aka the smartphone. He offered tips, techniques and his expertise on learning how to overcome its limitations, going beyond a simple snapshot to take better pictures and create photos that offer artistic expression. He recommended settings that are built right in our phones such as "Live" and "Grid" (on), "Flash" (off) and the reasons why. Editing software within our phones can enhance, straighten, crop (vertically and horizontally), etc., an image. There are also a wide array of editing and artistic apps out there; he showed us his favorites and also demonstrated a world class app called *Snapseed*. *Snapseed* is a free app for smart phones and tablets that members may be familiar with and perhaps have downloaded it already. It offers a variety of tools, from editing to repairing to enhancing photos. In Memoriam Patricia Zannie

It is with great sadness that we report that Patricia Zannie has recently passed away. A lifelong artist and a longtime member of RAL, she was an art instructor at Montgomery College and a founding member of Gallery 209 at Artists & Makers in Rockville. She was famous for her beautiful collages that were colorful, intricate and detailed; at first look they appeared to be paintings and on closer observation, it

was amazing to discover that they were made of the tiny bits of paper and ink. A creative spirit, her artwork was a reflection of her exuberant personality, and she had a wonderful energy that filled any room she was in. If you were fortunate to have met her or seen her artwork, you would not forget her. Members may remember her radiant *Sunflowers* collage was awarded Best in Show in the *RAL Juried Members Spring Show in 2021*, our first show back in person at Glenview after the lockdown. Our community is richer for unique vision, artistry and friendship and she will be missed. We send our sympathies and condolences to her family and many friends on such a huge loss.

Juried Members' Winter Show 2024—Judge's Notes

Congratulations to everyone – you made this show incredibly difficult to judge! As I wandered among the rooms displaying your work, simultaneously relishing my experience with each piece and moping because I had to somehow rank it, I got to musing about what, exactly, I was prioritizing in my choices and about the qualities that drew me to individual works.

This got me thinking about the lenses through which we view and experience works of art, and how I used those lenses to approach and gauge the first-place award winners and Best in Show. One lens is appreciating the way an artist uses the elements of art and principles of design in expert or unexpected ways. Other lenses could be our connection to specific subject matter and/or responding to the mood an artist encapsulates.

There are works that resonate with us on personal levels, of course, because they evoke a memory, capture a feeling, or remind us of something familiar. Digging deeper, though, we can also notice our personal experience of *experiencing* art as it happens. This is a particularly powerful lens for me. I want to be surprised, confused, challenged, or compelled to action. I want a work to demand that I take a second look, that I backtrack, stoop, or peer closer. I am also delighted when a work engages with the history of art, whether intended by the artist or not – and that is the lens was played an important role as I explored your pieces for this show.

It is at this point that I feel I should disclose my academic, art-historical background is in seventeenthcentury Dutch painting and printmaking. Two works initially grabbed my attention because they echoed something I connect with that period. Karen Norman's composition in 2D elevates the ordinary to the monumental in a way that recalls the work of still-life masters in the period traditionally called the Golden Age of Dutch painting. More subtle and powerful than that, though, was that Karen's painting seems to answer a simple question: how does an artist make work using only gray and brown luminous and beautiful? As someone who adores color, I found myself entranced by the simplicity of Karen's color palette and the powerful scale of her work.

The first-place winner in the photography category, Mauricio Athie's *Rincón de Chapala*, reminded me of the low horizons and huge skies with gobs of towering clouds of Dutch landscape paintings. Photography, perhaps more than other media, needs some luck in addition to the artist's persistence and technical skill. A breathtaking moment like this cannot be captured if it doesn't happen, but it also belies the hours (or days, weeks) spent waiting for that moment.

Liliane Blom's exceptional piece *Late Winter* overturns the tropes associated with the most persistent visualizations about aging. Once printmaking took off as a medium in its own right in Europe in the sixteenth century, the most popular prints were actually series of prints, specifically allegories of subjects like the senses, continents, seasons, and the ages of man. Often the final two were conflated – that is, an allegory of winter would also be an allegory of old age. Then and in the centuries that followed (including our own), aging is not often shown as a dignified process. One could simply not be more poised and self-possessed than the woman in Liliane's *Late Winter*.


Shifting to more modern associations, A. Barry Belman's *Love Birds* reminded me of Constantin Brâncusi's sleek abstraction and Auguste Rodin's tender blending of the boundaries between the loved and the beloved in his work. The quiet stillness of Patrick Sieg's *In the Weeds, Stonington, ME* make me think about an echoing stillness we find in the work of Edward Hopper. The tethered boat and dark house embody the architecture of daily life – the implied presence of people in an empty landscape. That and the silvery overtones of much of the painting brought the work of Andrew Wyeth to mind.

Susan Moses's *Hong Kong Night View* is somehow both luminous and hushed. I like when a work of art requires our eyes to adjust – to brightness or dimness – the way they do when we walk into a room on a sunny day or vice versa. As our eyes adjust to Susan's watercolor, what first strikes us as black shadow, black buildings, and black water fractures into an impossible range of blues and purples. Nocturnes have been a subgenre of landscape for centuries, and they continue to stand out in a big way.

Helen Wood's *African Marula* uses the properties of pastel to their fullest and yet, somehow, doesn't look like a pastel at first glance. It forces a second look to take in the juxtaposition of unexpected crispness against unexpected looseness rendered in a particularly fickle medium.







Rockville Art League Winter Garden January 26 – February 14 Glenview Mansion Art Gallery Entries accepted: December 12 - January 2

Winter will soon be upon us. As the temperatures drop, the gardens and parks outside transform to those of quietude with berries, branches and botanicals becoming the stars. Inside, on a warm and sunny sill or tabletop, plants will bask in the sunlight. A conservatory or greenhouse becomes an especially welcome sight. Many of us move our favorite plants indoors for safe keeping until spring and create our own indoor garden. Or perhaps your winter garden consists of a favorite botanical of another season – memories of vibrant leaves, fruit, maple samaras or milkweed fluff fluttering in the wind, beautiful flowers from a field, garden, or in a container or vase, locally or from an entirely different climate.

Looking out, looking in, enjoying what's outside, thriving inside, a favorite botanical, what spring might bring, the winter garden can fortify the spirit.

We are looking for your original creations of botanicals to transform the Glenview Mansion Art Gallery into a winter garden. Perhaps the harbinger of spring. And it might just be enough to sustain us until then.

Rockville Art League members in good standing are invited to submit original works of up three (3) pieces of art for consideration for this themed show Winter Garden to be exhibited at Glenview Mansion Art Gallery. We are honored to have Lisa Denison award prizes of recognition.

This themed show is sponsored by the City of Rockville and the Rockville Art League and will follow the RAL Juried Members' Winter Show and will be in conjunction with the 2025 Rockville Student Juried Art Exhibit.

Depending on the number of pieces accepted in the student show will determine how many pieces we can accommodate for this themed show.

Representational, abstract, impressionistic, etc., in the six different categories of medium listed below. Original artwork only may be submitted in the following mediums:

- oils/acrylics
- watercolors
- drawings, pastels, hand-pulled prints
- mixed media, collage, experimental
- photography
- sculpture

Note: the work for this show may have been exhibited in a prior show and acceptance in this show does not preclude its entry in a future show.

IMPORTANT! Please read the Show Agreement prior to entering. By submitting work into this show, you agree to the terms listed in the show agreement listed here:

"I agree to the rules of the show as presented in this show call and the schedule below, and that my entries are my original works. I will not hold the Rockville Art League (RAL), Glenview Mansion, or the City of Rockville responsible for any possible loss or damage to my entries. As with any show, I understand that all reasonable care will be taken in the handling of my artwork. I give RAL, Glenview Mansion, and the City of Rockville permission to use images of my artwork and publish them as appropriate. I acknowledge a commitment to donate 20% of the sale price of my work, if sold during this show at Glenview to the City of Rockville."

All two-dimensional (2-D) pieces will need to be framed, gallery-wrapped or professionally finished, securely wired, ready for hanging with the maximum measurement of any framed side of 48 inches. If submitting unframed work, the edges should be painted or finished. NO wet paint. Entries not meeting the show conditions will not be accepted. RAL retains the right to determine the suitability of the work for entry in this show.

HOW TO ENTER:

To submit work, please use your same personal link and password that was sent to you by Patrick Sieg when you renewed this year. Entries accepted: Dec. 12 - Jan. 2.

When you submit work, you will need to complete the following for each of your pieces (up to 3 entries only):

- Title
- Medium
- Price (not wholesale!) (If Not for Sale, please leave blank and we will confirm with you)
- A clear image (jpg.) of your artwork (no glare, no frame, no reflection, no furniture, etc.)
- Dimensions (note: depth is for sculpture only). If entering 2-D work, height, and width ONLY. PLEASE DO NOT fill out "depth" unless you are entering sculpture or ceramics.
- Description is optional; date is optional (do not check circa).

Note: When you submit work, if you entered artwork in the RAL Shows in the past year, you will still see the images of those pieces. They are marked internally for those shows within the system. The work entered from December 12 – January 2 will be marked internally specifically for the RAL Winter Garden Show.

Exhibition Dates: January 26 – Feb. 14 Entries accepted: December 12 – January 2 THURSDAY, January 2: deadline for all submissions.

Tuesday, Jan. 7 notification of acceptances sent out to all members and posted on RAL website. TUESDAY, Jan. 21: drop-off artwork at Glenview Mansion, 10:00am-1:00pm. (same date/time as pick up of RAL Juried Members' Winter Show) SUNDAY, Jan. 26: "Meet the Artists" opening at Glenview. 1:30-3:30pm. TUESDAY, Feb. 18 pickup of artwork 10:00am-1:00pm.

This show will be exhibited in person at Glenview Mansion (located at the Rockville Civic Center Park/603 Edmonston Dr.) Additionally, the virtual show will be available to view on the Rockville Art League website and sent to all members to share. We look forward to seeing your creations.

Deadline for submissions: Thursday, January 2.


As always, if you need help, please ask ahead of the deadline.

Notifications of accepted artwork will be sent out on Jan. 7 with delivery of artwork on Tuesday, Jan. 21, 10am-1pm, the same date and time as the Juried Members' Winter Show pick-up.

Virtual Shows, Sales, and Inquiries

Virtual shows are updated and posted to the Rockville Art League website by webmaster Michael Auger. The *Rockville Art League Juried Members' Winter Show* is currently available to view.

How to access the current virtual show and past ones:

Go to <u>https://rockvilleartleague.org</u> and click on the button for the current virtual show, *RAL Juried Members' Winter Show*. (If you haven't visited the RAL website lately, you may need to hit refresh.) Once you open the current virtual show, you can view all the work in the show, or if you prefer to see it by *specific artist*, click on the word "Artists" and, if you would like to view it by category of artwork, click on the word "Rooms". If you are interested in a specific piece, you can click on that artwork. If you would like to view a past virtual show, click on the word "Exhibitions" and you will see the show cards from prior shows.

Find the show card of the one you would like to view and click on the name of the show (ex: *RAL Water, Water Everywhere Show, RAL Juried Members' Spring Show, Portraits: Creatures Great or Small, or The Colorists*) right below the show card and you can view that show. (Note: RAL's Artwork Archive account has the capacity to store up to 1000 images of artwork; as new shows are uploaded, the works in past shows are no longer viewable. We do retain records with images of work from past shows.)

You can inquire or send a purchase request on the piece on the virtual show. On occasion, we receive inquiries for work in past shows still viewable through our virtual shows. Any inquiries or purchase requests are forwarded to the artist.

How to inquire about or purchase a piece in a Rockville Art League Show on display at Glenview: If you are in the gallery at Glenview and you are interested in a piece, click on the **QR code** found right on the label below the work. Instructions are also found in the various rooms of the gallery. It's easy. Just **aim your smartphone at the QR code** and <u>click on the link</u> that appears, and it will take you to the piece. Once there, you will see the artwork, the medium, dimensions and, if the piece is available, the price. You can click on "Inquire" or "Purchase" if you are interested further. We forward all inquiries or purchase requests to the artist.

If you are at Glenview and forgot your phone or just can't quite figure out a QR code, no worries. Either take a picture of the label or write down the name of the piece and contact either Lisa Sieg (jshows@rockvilleartleague.org) or Patrick Sieg (president@rockvilleartleague.org). Or go to the RAL website and look for us under contacts.




