# RAL Juried Members' Winter Show JUROR'S STATEMENT

I would like to begin by thanking the Rockville Art League for inviting me to serve as juror for this exhibition. My special thanks go to Lisa and Pat, whose excellent organization, clarity, and kindness made the entire process smooth and enjoyable. This is, in fact, the third time I have been asked to judge a show for the League, which makes the honor even greater. I am truly grateful for the trust you continue to place in me.

I would like to share a few thoughts I had throughout the process. Every juror says this, but it is absolutely true: judging an art show is extremely difficult. In my career I am primarily an artist and a teacher. I also occasionally give lectures and serve as a juror, and among all these roles, judging a show is by far the most challenging. Creating art is, for the artist, a deeply meaningful act. Behind every artwork there is a person—someone with feelings, emotions, and a creative process that deserves recognition. That process, the motivations, and the courage to put something meaningful into the world are, to me, the most important aspects of art regardless of the final outcome. In that sense, everyone here deserves to be celebrated; everyone could be "best in show."

However, in the practical context of an exhibition, I must make selections. I must choose which works will be part of the show and, among them, which ones stand out for the awards. To do so, I considered several dimensions.

Technical skill is the foundation. When an artist knows how to use their medium in a way that enhances the meaning or purpose of the work, the piece gains strength. Of course, there are exceptions—works where technique is not the strongest aspect, yet something else shines so brightly that it cannot be overlooked.

Composition was another key factor: how form, shape, placement, texture, and color come together to create beauty, harmony, tension, or interest. Both traditional and unconventional approaches can be equally powerful when they are intentional and well resolved.

I also took into account style, because each approach brings its own challenges. Realistic works, abstract pieces, expressionistic visions, symbolic imagery—each belongs to a different visual language. Comparing them is not simple, but what mattered most was whether the piece excelled within the direction it embraced.

Some works distinguished themselves through originality. This does not mean that every piece must be radically new; traditional works can be compelling and fresh. But occasionally a piece surprises you, offering something unexpected, and that quality is valuable.

Another dimension was the message or emotional resonance of the work. This is perhaps the most subjective aspect of all. The artist may intend one thing, and the viewer may receive another—but when a work suggests something beyond the image itself, when it invites reflection or emotion, it becomes memorable.

While reviewing the entries, I also noticed works that were especially ambitious—in subject matter, scale, complexity, or technical challenge. Ambition is admirable, but it also increases the difficulty of fully succeeding. A simpler work, executed with clarity and confidence, can sometimes be more successful. Yet I deeply value the impulse to go beyond one's comfort zone. That desire to surpass oneself is something I relate to personally—every time I start a painting, I believe it will be better than the last. That striving is part of what makes being an artist so meaningful.

The judging process itself was different this year. The first stage—reviewing entries online—has advantages and disadvantages. It allows more time to sit with the work, to revisit it, to reflect. But photographs can only show so much. Color, texture, subtle details, and even the presence of a piece can change dramatically when seen in person. Coming to judge the awards in the gallery made a significant difference, and in several cases, I was pleasantly surprised—or saw things differently—once I stood before the actual artworks.

In the end, I hope each artist feels proud of the work created and submitted. The passion, dedication, and individuality evident throughout the exhibition made the judging both difficult and inspiring. Thank you to all the artists for sharing your vision, your effort, and a part of yourselves.

# Rockville Art League Seeing Red

January 25 – February 13 Glenview Mansion Art Gallery

**Entries Accepted: December 10 – January 2** 

Colorful, beautiful, emotional. No other color can grab your attention and evoke such emotion or add so much energy to anything and everything. From a velvety red rose, a dramatic red sky at night or morning, fiery red leaves, a bowl of cherries, snazzy red shoes, a welcoming red door, to a slick red car. Common in everyday expressions - red hot, red-letter day, paint the town red, red carpet, in the red, code red, and how about that lady in red, the list can go on and on.

For many, many centuries RED was THE color, in fact, in some languages it was the word for color, and then it fell from grace and was considered indecent and decadent, the color of luxury and excess. It's passionate, it's edgy, it's dangerous, symbolic of so much – love and romance, anger and aggression, power and courage, good fortune and happiness. Beloved in fashion and design for its glamor and ability

to elevate the ordinary. A touch, a shade or a jolt of red can instantly energize an artwork. Red has commanded the attention of artists and their audiences throughout history.

This winter the Rockville Art League invites its members in good standing to submit up to 3 pieces to be considered for this themed show *Seeing Red*. The work should feature red or a shade of red, in one of the 6 categories of mediums listed below. Please read the entirety of the show call before entering work. We look forward to seeing your artistic creations that include this dynamic color.

This themed show, *Seeing Red*, is sponsored by the City of Rockville Arts Division and will be in conjunction with the Rockville Student Art Show.

Depending on the number of pieces accepted in the student show will determine how many pieces we can accommodate for this themed show.

Original artwork only may be submitted in the following mediums only:

- oils/acrylics
- watercolors
- drawings, pastels, hand-pulled prints
- mixed media, collage, experimental
- photography
- sculpture
- The work for this show may have been exhibited in a prior show and acceptance in this show does not preclude its entry in a future show.
- RAL retains the right to determine the suitability of the work for entry in this show.

IMPORTANT! Please read the Show Agreement prior to entering. By submitting work into this show, you agree to the terms listed in the show agreement listed here:

"I agree to the rules of the show as presented in this show call and the schedule below, and that my entries are my original works. I will not hold the Rockville Art League (RAL), Glenview Mansion, or the City of Rockville responsible for any possible loss or damage to my entries. As with any show, I understand that all reasonable care will be taken in the handling of my artwork. I give RAL, Glenview Mansion, and the City of Rockville permission to use images of my artwork and publish them as appropriate. I acknowledge a commitment to donate 20% of the sale price of my work, if sold during this show at Glenview to the City of Rockville."

All two-dimensional (2-D) pieces will need to be framed, gallery-wrapped or professionally finished, securely wired, ready for hanging with the *maximum* measurement of any framed side of 48 inches. If submitting unframed work, the edges should be painted or finished. NO wet paint. Entries not meeting the show conditions will not be accepted.

#### **HOW TO ENTER:**

<u>To submit work</u>, please use *your same personal link and password* that was sent to you by Patrick Sieg when you renewed this year. Entries accepted: Dec. 10 - Jan. 2.

When you submit work, you will need to complete the following for <u>each of your pieces</u> (*up to 3 entries only*):

- Title
- Medium
- **Price** (not wholesale!) (If Not for Sale, please leave blank and we will confirm with you)
- A clear image (jpg.) of your artwork (no glare, no frame, no reflection, no furniture, etc.)
- **Dimensions** (<u>note</u>: *depth is for sculpture only*). If entering 2-D work, height, and width ONLY. PLEASE DO NOT fill out "depth" unless you are entering sculpture or ceramics.
- Description is optional; date is optional (<u>do not check circa</u>).

<u>Note</u>: When you submit work, *if you entered artwork in the RAL Shows in the past year*, you will still see the images of those pieces. They are marked internally for those shows within the system. The work entered from **December 10 – January 2** will be marked internally specifically for the **RAL SEEING RED Show**.

**Tuesday, Jan. 6** notification of acceptances sent out to all members and posted on RAL website. **TUESDAY, Jan. 20:** drop-off artwork at Glenview Mansion, **10:00am-1:00pm**. (same date/time as pick up of *RAL Juried Members' Winter Show*)

SUNDAY, Jan. 25: "Meet the Artists" opening at Glenview. 1:30-3:30pm.

TUESDAY, Feb. 17 pick-up of artwork 10:00am-1:00pm.

This show will be exhibited in person at Glenview Mansion (located at the Rockville Civic Center Park/603 Edmonston Dr.) Additionally, the virtual show will be available to view on the Rockville Art League website and sent to all members to share.

We look forward to seeing your creations.

### **Deadline for submissions**: Friday, January 2.

As always, if you need help, please ask ahead of the deadline.

**NOTE:** please be aware that the time between the notifications and the delivery of artwork is brief - approximately 2 weeks - so please be sure any work entered *will be ready for display* by the drop-off date.


# **Glenview Mansion Art Gallery Exhibitions**

# Virtual Shows, Sales, and Inquiries

## How to access the current virtual show and past ones:

Go to <a href="https://rockvilleartleague.org">https://rockvilleartleague.org</a> and click on the button for the current virtual show, *RAL Juried Members' Winter Show*.

Once you open the current virtual show, you can view all the work in the show, or if you prefer to see it by *specific artist*, click on the word "**Artists**" and, if you would like to view it by category of artwork, click on the word "**Rooms**". If you are interested in a specific piece, you can click on that artwork.

If you would like **to view a past virtual show**, click on the word "Exhibitions" and you will see the show cards from prior shows.

Find the show card of the one you would like to view and click on the name of the show (ex: *RAL Cloud Covers* and *RAL Juried Members Spring Show*) right below the show card and you can view that show. (Note: RAL's Artwork Archive account has the capacity to store up to 1000 images of artwork; as new shows are uploaded, the work in past shows are no longer viewable. We do retain records with images of work from past shows.)

You can inquire or send a purchase request on the piece on the virtual show. On occasion, we receive inquiries for work in past shows still viewable through our virtual shows. Any inquiries or purchase requests are forwarded to the artist.

How to inquire about or purchase a piece in a Rockville Art League Show on display at Glenview: If you are in the gallery at Glenview and you are interested in a piece, click on the QR code found right on the label below the work. Instructions are also found in the various rooms of the gallery. It's easy. Aim your smartphone at the QR code and <u>click on the link</u> that appears and it will take you to the piece. Once there, you will see the artwork, the medium, dimensions and, if the piece is available, the price. You can click on "Inquire" or "Purchase" if you are interested further. We forward all inquiries or purchase requests to the artist.

If you are at Glenview and forgot your phone or just can't quite figure out a QR code, no worries. 
